Green Hairstreak e.g.	16/02/15	Kinder, SK 097 873	2
Where to look: scrubby grassland, woodland, heaths, moors, bogs. When to look: April – July. What to look for: a small butterfly which holds its wings closed at rest showing their metallic green undersides. In flight the brown upper sides are seen. The only UK species with green colouring.			
Orange Tip			
Where to look: damp grassland, river banks, gardens, hedgerows. When to look: April – July. What to look for: A medium-sized, white butterfly. Males have bright orange wing tips. Females can be easily confused with other white butterflies so please only record males.			
Peacock Peacock			
When to look: usually April – October but they can emerge from hibernation as early as January. What to look for: large, colourful butterfly with distinctive eyespots which deter predators. The undersides of the wings are almost black.
